

The Impact of the IGRA on Native American Reservation Poverty

Motivation

To assess the impact on poverty rates that the 1987 Indian Gaming Regulatory Act (IGRA) had, which has allowed reservations to create gaming compacts with their state and open casinos.

Research Question

Do Native American Reservations with casinos have lower poverty rates?


Methodology

Census Bureau data was collected for the 100 most populous Native American Reservations for the years 1970, 1980, 1990, 2000, 2010, 2015, and 2020. A difference in difference method was used to create the casino presence variable for a linear regression. Control variables include unemployment rate, population, region, numbers of casinos, and years open.



Conclusions

The regression indicates a negative association between casino presence and the reservation's poverty rate. In other words, casino presence has a preferable, decreasing relationship with poverty rates.
