NET TAXABLE RETAIL SALES, 1968-1971

Net taxable retail sales made by Nebraska firms were \$3,604 million in 1971 (See Table 1). This represented a 9.0 percent gain over 1970's dollar volume. Following a 3.4 percent 1969-to-1970 gain, which was markedly below the 9.6 percent 1968-to-1969 increase, the 1971 situation was one of marked improvement. Thus, from 1968 to 1971 there has been a 23.5 percent increase, or an annual average rate of 7.3 percent.

The commodities component of the Consumer Price Index rose 13.2 percent, or at an annual rate of 4.2 percent, from 1968 to 1971. Thus, even after discounting the growth in dollar sales for the general rise in prices, there has been a considerable real increase in retail activity.

Estimates of population show an increase from July, 1968, to July, 1971, of 2.7 percent, or an annual rate of nearly 0.9 percent.² There has, therefore, been not only a rise in the physical volume of retail activity but also a rise in the goods consumed

per capita.

Data available elsewhere indicate that the improvement is continuing at an accelerated pace. The dollar sales volume of the first four months of 1972 was 14 percent above that of the same period in 1971 (See Table 3 of Review and Outlook, page 4). Although not exactly equivalent to net taxable retail sales, retail activity indexes, after adjustment for price level change, have shown monthly levels of activity over the first four months of 1972 averaging 9 percent above the same period of last year. (See Table 4 of Review and Outlook, page 5.) It can be said, therefore, that retail sector of the state's economy is showing considerable strength—especially when compared with the 1970 situation.

That 1970 was a year of slow growth in the retail sector and one generally below that of 1969 is shown in Table 1. Excepting Regions 20 (McCook) and 13 (Hastings), which recorded gains greater in 1970 than in 1969, all the state's planning and development regions either had gains in net taxable retail sales in 1970 that fell far short of the 1969 gains over 1968 or experienced declines. Four regions and thirty-seven counties experienced absolute declines from 1969 to 1970. All regions and all but four counties (Greeley, Hitchcock, Kimball, and Logan) registered higher sales volumes in 1971 than 1970. (Continued on page 6)



(Continued from first page) Only Hitchcock and Greeley have had sales declines in all three years since 1968.

Analysis of the 1968 to 1971 changes reveals that regional increases ranged from a low of 11.9 percent for Region 25 (Hartington) to a high of 32.3 percent for Region 18 (North Platte). Eight of the state's 26 regions had relative increases that exceeded the state increase of 23.5 percent. (See Table 1 and Map on page 1.) Regions 18 (North Platte) and 2 (Lincoln) recorded gains exceeding 30 percent; the other six regions' sales increased between 25 and 30 percent. Only Region 25 (Hartington) registered a dollar volume gain of less than 13 percent, the rise in the price level for commodities between 1968 and 1971. Thus, even after adjusting the figures for price level change, there have been real increases in retail activity in all but one region.

In 1971 there were twenty-seven cities whose net taxable retail sales, excluding motor vehicle sales,³ amounted to at least 25 percent⁴ of the sales generated in those regions for which they may be designated as major retail trade centers. These localities, plus the three others also shown in Table 2, comprise most of the

state's major retail trade centers. In 1971 the net taxable retail sales, thus defined, of the twenty-seven centers ranged from a high of \$1,062.4 million for Omaha to a low of \$10.6 million for West Point. As a group the thirty centers accounted for \$2,429.9 million, or nearly 76 percent, of the state's total retail sales of \$3,206.1 million, excluding motor vehicles.

Led by Falls City with its 41.0 percent gain, thirteen of the thirty centers showed sales increases from 1968 to 1971 in excess of the 22.8 percent increase registered for the state as a whole. Five other centers (Bellevue, Broken Bow, Kearney, Lincoln, and North Platte) registered gains in excess of 30 percent.

Of special concern are the changes that have occurred in "share of region" positions. A decline in a center's share of its region's sales can be taken as indicative of a weakening of that center's competitive position. The result could be an increase in the difficulty of increasing, or even maintaining, local economic growth. Table 3 presents a comparison of the shares of regional totals for the four years of 1968 through 1971. Twenty-three of the thirty centers have increased their shares of their respective regions' totals. Marked gains were registered by York, Falls City, Sidney, Broken Bow, and McCook in that order. Notable declines in shares were experienced by Grand Island and Ogallala.
